In Moldova over the past five years, collaboration between local police and Interpol have thwarted four attempts by smugglers to sell nuclear material to extremists in the Middle East. While these attempts failed in the end, the scenario of terrorists armed with weapons of mass destruction is no longer just theoretical. This four and a half day course provides you with the analytical tools to deal with terrorist attacks and accidents involving chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear (CBRN) material.

COURSE BENEFITS

The course is designed to bring out the best of the three central elements that form the basis of the GCSP's unique learning experience: the latest research from prominent academics, the wisdom of accomplished practitioners, and the collective experience of professional participants. By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- build a holistic approach to CBRN incidents, at both the political and operational levels

COURSE FOCUS:

The modules of this course will cover each of the CBRN domains in a similar way: an opening discussion of the legal regimes surrounding the topic followed by a pragmatic discussion of detection measures, consequences, and potential government responses. Each domain will feature a practical exercise to immerse you in the topic.

The practical exercises will simulate:

- how to find find radioactive material and build a dirty bomb
- how to react to biological contamination at a major airport
- how to detect and neutralise threats sent through incoming mail











Course Director

Dr Jean-Marc Rickli is the leader of the Global Risk and Resilience thematic cluster at the GCSP. Prior to his current appointment, he was lecturer at the Department of Defence Studies at King's College London and at the National Defence College in Qatar. He has a PhD in international relations from the University of Oxford.

Dr Jean-Marc Vaucher has taken part in the Swiss Federal Commission for CBRN Protection (ComABC), works as an expert in materials hazards for the Swiss Safety Investigation Board (STSB), and participated in the implementation of the Paraguay and the Philippines CBRN defence. He has a PhD in chemistry from the University of Neuchâtel.
